

HFOT VETERANS CORNER- AMPUTEE OUTDOORS

NO LEGS, NO LIMITS

HFOT veterans Tony Mullis and Michael Boucher help other injured veterans return to the great outdoors

Some things have changed for Corporals Tony Mullis and James "Michael" Boucher since they were left double amputees as a result of separate improvised explosive devices (IED's) in Afghanistan. But their love for outdoor activities, namely hunting and fishing, remains intact, something the two credit to the rehabilitation program at Walter Reed Medical Center. That's where they were reintroduced to the activities they loved prior to their injuries.

"The therapeutic sporting activities and outdoor trips reassured us," says Mullis. "They helped us to see that we could have normal lives." Now, both Mullis and Boucher are hoping to give other severely injured veterans that same kind of confidence by guiding them on outdoor activities through their newly launched business venture Amputee Outdoors (AO).

"Our mission is to show people like us that they can still run the show," says Mullis. "They can do the things they once loved to do-they just have to do it differently." Mullis' partner Boucher stresses that AO will be different from other outdoor excursion-based companies, stressing the one-on-one lessons they will deliver to their clients. "We don't want to take a big group and have these guys only sit and watch," says Boucher.

Instead, veterans in AO will learn to master the adaptive techniques needed to climb a ladder stand and manage their rifles safely while hunting, an accomplishment Boucher says for him felt like "winning the lottery."

Their journey of self discovery unknowingly started in April 2011, when Boucher got news Mullis had been severely injured in a blast, the explosion occurring just one day after Mullis had become a dad. Boucher says hearing this gave him an instant "gut check."

"I pretty much thought Tony's life was over," says Boucher, who served his second deployment with Mullis' platoon.

Two months later, though, it was Boucher who was severely injured in an IED blast, waking up in a hospital to realize he had met the same fate as Mullis. A bedside visit from Mullis, who was already up walking on prosthetics, gave Boucher his first bode of confidence that life without legs would indeed be survivable. At the moment, recalls Boucher, "I didn't even think of Tony as a double amputee."

Boucher and Mullis are eager to share that kind of "a ha moment" with patients recovering at Walter Reed and other facilities. AO, the two believe, can assist with the transition from combatant to civilian, allowing them to once again feel a sense of purpose and camaraderie.

As HFOT homeowners with no monthly mortgage worries, both Mullis and Boucher look forward to devoting time helping their fellow injured warriors recover physically and mentally. The two are waiting to receive official nonprofit status for AO from the IRS; once they do, AO will be eligible for charitable donations and federal grant monies. In recent weeks, Mullis and Boucher have also been busy pitching their outdoor adventures to network execs with the hopes of landing a reality TV show.



FROM INJURY TO INDEPENDENCE

Army Wife, Jennifer Jergens, Reflects on Her Husband's Injuries and Recovery



The journey of future HFOT home recipient, Army Sergeant Brian Jergens, who continues to recover from catastrophic injuries he sustained in Afghanistan in 2010, has been nothing short of miraculous. In the story that follows, Brian's wife Jennifer reflects on how the two have persevered through the darkest of days after the blast, and subsequently, through Brian's rehabilitation and recovery.

The call came on August 7, 2011, as Jennifer Jergens, then 18, was returning to her sister's home after a bridal fair: Jennifer's newlywed husband Brian, an Army Medic, had been gravely injured when his HUMVEE was hit by an improvised explosive device.

"I didn't get many details, only that he had lost his legs," recalls Jennifer, married to Brian only 8 months. "Little did I know that was about to be the least of our worries."

Hours later, Jennifer would listen to a

voice on the phone dictate the seemingly endless report of Brian's injuries as a result of being tossed from his HUMVEE: severe traumatic brain injury, hearing loss, internal organ damage, a broken neck, and severe damage to his right elbow.

Doctors managed to stabilize Brian for transport to Landstuhl, Germany, where he would undergo various surgeries, including an emergency (and rare) craniectomy- a last resort procedure in which doctors removed part of Brian's skull to allow room for his swelling brain to expand.

After a grueling week, Jennifer was finally able to visit Brian's bedside at Brook Army Medical Center (BAMC). A doctor and Army Liaison had prepped her on what to expect in the ICU, but to some degree she didn't care. "I couldn't wait to get in his room to hold his hand and tell him it was alright and we would get through this," she says.

Jennifer arrived to see Brian attached to an array of tubes and wires, including a tracheotomy tube in his neck to allow breathing. Says Jennifer, "He was swollen and beat up, but he was still my Brian."

Over the next few weeks, Jennifer would see Brian through a dizzying array of fever spikes and precariously low drops in blood pressure. One night in September nurses discovered him in the middle of the night in a pool of blood. Doctors later cauterized an ulcerated blood vessel in his stomach to stop the bleeding

"With all the infections and bleeding Brian had, things would change by the minute," says Jennifer, comforted at the time by the prayers of friends. "Growing up my mom always told me that God would never give me something I couldn't handle, so I always said that to Brian."

The turnaround for the couple came in mid-September when doctors cleared Brian for transport to California's Palo Alto Poly Trauma Center. Brian was able to swallow ice chips and move his legs sporadically. By October, his physical therapists were able to move Brian into his wheelchair and actually take an excursion outside to the facility's healing garden. The next month, Brian was able to swallow apple sauce at Thanksgiving.

Over the next year, Brian continued to make progress in physical, occupational and speech therapies, exceeding personal goals set for him by his practitioners at the Palo Alto Poly Trauma Center. Good news kept getting better. In April 2012, Brian and Jennifer learned that they would be receiving a specially adapted home from Homes for Our Troops; they're due to move in on December 12, 2013. And last July, the couple were also on the receiving end of another miracle-this time in the way of a 7 pound, 9 ounce boy-Jackson Christopher.

"Brian surprised all the doctors and nurses who took care of him," says Jennifer. "No one ever thought back then that he would be here today, walking and taking care of his son."

While Jackson's first steps as a teetering toddler are months away, his dad should be a great teacher, walking on his new prosthetics in just a few months. Of course Jackson's been a great motivator for Brian, too.

"Brian wants to be able to kick a soccer ball with him or throw a ball when he grows up," says Jennifer, adding that her husband now prefers to walk without crutches. "He wants to be able to carry our son around which he can't do with his hands occupied by his crutches."

Last August, Brian, Jennifer and Jackson were invited by Homes for Our Troops to San Francisco's AT&T Park to ceremoniously toss the first pitch at a Giants game, which drew nearly 50,000 spectators.

Pivoting on his prosthetics and clenching Jennifer's hand instead of his cane, Brian took to the mound and lobbed the ball toward the catcher. It was a bit wobbly and off speed, but he reached his target. Home.

A Key Ceremony for Brian and Jennifer Jergens will be held in Hollister, Calif. on December 12. The couple would like to express their gratitude to the HFOT community in helping secure their family's dreams for the future.
